

### **Item Description**

The cloud of glory, Mount Sinai, and welcoming the stranger are three Jewish concepts that are architecturally interpreted by this Sukkah, In the Torah the cloud of glory conceals the Schechinah, the Dwelling Presence of the LORD. The same cloud lead Israel in the wilderness, descended on Mount Sinai and settled upon the Tabernacle. Sukkot, is the festival of the clouds: specifically, the festival of the cloud of glory. The booth [Sukkah] in which the Israelites of the wilderness lived were none other than the cloud of glory that went before the host of Israel.

The concept of welcoming the stranger, a key Jewish principial. is mentioned in the Torah 37 times. Creating transparent walls, the Sukkah is a powerful reminder of the Mitzva [good deed] of welcoming the stranger at a time when so many have been adversely impacted by both health and economic problems.

Utilizing contemporary techniques, and materials; 4'x8' 3/16"" thick plexiglass with a colored film hint of Mount Sinai and 1½"PVC piping and fittings they create a Sukkah Drash. These elegant, simple materials will be easily constructed and disassembled for storage and reuse, The Sc'hach roof material is local bamboo, a Princeton invasive plant.
